Browse the Tarwin Lower Mechanics Institute Summer Market on Monday 29 December, featuring food, plants, clothing, crafts, books, music and more set around the hall's grassy grounds. The hall also screens films, with Living Is Easy with Eyes Closed (Spanish Drama) showing on 16 January. The Riverview Hotel offers a lovely deck for outdoor meals and hosts cracking gigs, including the legendary Cosmic Psychos on 31 January. Browse the local art at Thirsty Work Studio, pick up farm-fresh produce at Flock Stock and Basil's farmgate, or try your hand at frisbee golf at Shark Park. And if you need to wind down, why not cast a line from one of the peaceful fishing platforms dotting the riverbank, or go for a walk to the marvellous Bald Hills wetlands bird hide, where a plethora of gorgeous waterbirds await discovery.

After your adventures, head to the Walky Kiosk for their famous (and delicious) burgers. For bushwalkers, the quick walk to the lighthouse at Cape Liptrap offers stunning coastal panoramas, while the trek up the hill from the back of Walky North Caravan Park leads to a lookout with breathtaking views of Wilsons Promontory. Don't miss Bear Gully for koala spotting – these grumpy marsupials can often be seen dozing in the gum trees around the campground. And if you're around on a Friday evening, drop in on the Walky CFA. They're holding their regular Friday night Summer Open Station dinners, where you can expect to catch up with plenty of locals and holiday makers. Bring a plate!

The Rusty Gunard pub delivers live music and excellent food (apprentice chef Jesse Payne has just been accepted into a prestigious mentoring program), and the Port Welshpool General Store has outstanding fish and chips and inventive and delicious hot dogs and burgers. Don't miss the Sea Days Festival on 3-4 January at The Old Ferry Terminal on Lewis Street. Now in its 22nd year, this family-focused celebration features activities and displays for all ages, showcasing the best of this historic fishing village's maritime heritage and community spirit.

Foster is the Prom Coast's bustling heart, where country charm meets community spirit – and there's heaps happening in town over summer. Art lovers shouldn't miss Stockyard Gallery's January exhibition, featuring Jacqueline Christians' coastal landscapes and Dina Goebel's marine resin sculptures. Find a great book (or 50) at the fabulous Foster Library Book Sale on 9-10 January. The Prom Country Farmers Market on 17 January (8am-12pm at FWMAC Hall) is celebrating almost 20 years of connecting customers directly with local growers and makers. The Prom Produce and Craft Market on 28 December and 25 January brings over 200 stalls to the Foster Showground oval, and is run by Foster Rotary and Toora Lions. Outside of markets, you can explore the fascinating Foster Historical Museum (on weekends), cool off at the lovely swimming pool nestled by the golf club, browse the shops or take a drink at the many cafes or the pub. Get your blood pumping by mountain biking on Foster's great bushland paths, enjoy a round of golf with a delicious meal at Ram's to follow, or take a Pilates class at Prom Health's new gym.



Our beloved Wilsons Promontory offers something for every nature lover, from pristine beaches to scenic mountain walks - but these are *Prom Coast News*'s fave (and often less crowded) spots. Explore the northern reaches of the park with a climb up Mt Vereker for glorious views, or head to Darby River where kids can play in the sand dunes, kayak the tranquil waters or catch waves. As the sun sets, grab a cold drink from the Tidal River store and settle in to watch the rays paint the sky over Norman Bay, then end your day the perfect way: with a movie and a homemade choctop at the Prom Open Air Cinema. And if you've ever wanted to know why Whale Rock is the way it is, get along to one of the Prom Coast Ecolink's Tidal River Geology Walks on 8 and 15 January (more details p24).

Tarry a while in Toora, and you'll uncover

a wealth of hidden treasures and natural wonders. Wander through the historic Pear Orchard, dig through The Panton Store for beautiful homewares, check out the art at Red Earth Gallery, visit the Art Cube at Sagasser Park and grab a roll at the deli or cafe to fuel your wanderings. The public swimming pool near the school often hosts special days with giant pool length inflatables set up for kids – don't forget to bring a snag for the BBO and keep an eve on the Toora pool Facebook for dates. And while the pub remains closed for now, cool drinks can be discovered at the RSL and Bowling Club. Up in the hills, nature lovers will be enchanted by Agnes Falls' cool green rainforest and enormous waterfall, while down at the water, the bird hide is a peaceful place to spot migratory waders.
